About

Radford University is a comprehensive public university of 7,718 students. Radford University serves the Commonwealth of Virginia and the nation through a wide range of academic, cultural, human service and research programs. The University offers 76 bachelor's degree programs in 47 disciplines, two associate degrees, and six certificates at the undergraduate level; 28 master's programs in 23 disciplines and six doctoral programs at the graduate level; and 17 post-baccalaureate certificates and one post-master's certificate. In addition to robust academic offerings and engaging student experiences on the main campus located in Radford, Virginia, Radford University also offers a clinical-based educational experience for more than 1,100 students living and learning in Roanoke, Virginia as part of Radford University Carilion, a public-private partnership focused on the cutting-edge delivery of health sciences programming, outreach and service.

The university atmosphere is residential. Most students live in university residence halls or in private apartments and houses within walking distance of the campus.

Connected Communities

A resource for all students, staff and faculty providing a variety of programs, activities and services. We provide educational and social experiences for students and employees that promote global citizenry and advance thriving communities both on campus and in the world. Additionally, we engage the campus community about awareness and appreciation of the multifaceted aspects of our identities including programming and resources for faith and religion interests. Resources include the Laptop Loaner Program and free printing. Diversity Awareness Programming Board is one of many student organizations advised by Connected Communities.

Center for Accessibility Services

CAS is committed to inclusion so that all individuals on campus can fully participate in the university experience. CAS serves and supports students, family members and visitors seeking reasonable accommodations under the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Helping Eradicate Homelessness through Resources Opportunities and Supplies (HEHROS)

The HEHROS program is focused on supporting students who have food insecurities, are homeless, at risk for becoming homeless or in transition while on campus. HEHROS aims to mitigate the challenges students face, enhance quality of life by connecting them with available resources and empowering them to succeed. A food pantry is located on campus and every community member is eligible to get food.

Highlander Success Center

At the HSC, students' academic achievement, engagement, and belonging are priorities. The HSC faculty and staff offer intentional academic support services of Academic Advising and Retention Services and keep students connected to important people on and off campus through Career and Talent Development and Student Connection Programs.

Office of Institutional Equity

OIE supports and advances the University's commitment to diversity, equity and access. We provide education, guidance and leadership to administrators, faculty & staff in their efforts to comply with Title IX of the Education Amendments Act of 1972, equal opportunity in education, programs, employment and ensure safety on campus and a campus free from discrimination and harassment for our students, faculty and staff.

First Gen Center

First-generation college students — the first people in their immediate families to pursue higher education — often must navigate the college education process on their own. The FGC was designed to lift and advance these students and their families.

Selu Conservancy

Radford University's Selu Conservancy is an impressive retreat/meeting center and classroom facility that offers 380 acres of natural beauty and charm. It's an "extended classroom" with a 4,000 square-foot "Barn" equipped with meeting rooms and an observatory.
